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Introduction

- The Strategic Review of Policing in England and Wales is a major independent review of policing chaired by Sir Michael Barber and hosted by the Police Foundation
- So far we have concluded Phase 1 which explores the challenge facing policing
- Phase 2 will go on to look at how we should respond to that challenge: role and purpose, collaboration, legitimacy, workforce, resources, organisation and governance



1. Phase 1 findings



Traditional crime has fallen by 70%





The perception of ASB as a problem has declined

Future trends

- As digital devices become more powerful, numerous and interconnected citizens' exposure to cybercrime, already high, will increase further.
 - How to regulate and police the information space will be one of the preeminent political questions.
 - As the ability to surveil citizens increases policing will need to find ways of protecting privacy and acting proportionately.
- Police organisations will need to be sufficiently agile to respond to major disruptive events.
- Policing will need to strengthen its legitimacy to appropriately manage social and political tensions.
- As age related expenditures grow and as the public finances recover from the pandemic, the resources available to policing are likely to remain constrained. The tension between tackling hidden harm and providing visibility and a universal service will become more acute. The need to organise preventative public safety systems to reduce crisis demand will become more pressing.
- As police work continues to diversify so too must the police workforce.

- What should be the role of the police?
- What should be the relationship between the police service and other agencies and actors involved in public safety and security?
- How can the legitimacy of policing be strengthened, particularly with those parts of our community among whom confidence in the police is low?
- What should the future police workforce look like?
- How should the public police service be resourced?
- How should it be organised, locally, regionally and nationally?
- How should it be governed and held to account?



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
