Please find below our response to your correspondence dated 31 May in which you made the following request under the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002:

I would be grateful if you could provide me with details of the policy adopted by the Scottish Police Authority in relation to the giving of Recorded Police Warnings and especially the guidance given to its police officers as to when and how they should give such warnings, in particular, the following;

- (i) how a police officer should decide when it is appropriate to give such a warning,
- (ii) how the police officer should engage with the person to whom the warning is to be given and
- (iii) how the person receiving the warning should be advised that the warning has been recorded.

If you remain dissatisfied following the outcome of that review, you are thereafter entitled to apply to the Office of the Scottish Information Commissioner within six months for a decision.
