It should also document the processes and practical arrangements necessary for that partnership to deliver the operational/business requirements that have been identified. PWAs also describe

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					<p>the agreed roles and responsibilities of the partners involved. PWAs are managed for Police Scotland by Information Assurance (IA). The IA team will support officers/staff in assessing the requirement for, and development of PWAs. The team also conduct compliance checks on PWAs drafted by Police Scotland and our partners and has access to archive material that may be useful in the development of superseding PWAs, as periodic reviews are conducted.</p> <p>Propose to Close</p>

To improve our understanding and response to violence, work is being developed in relation to specific aspects of violence including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Patterns in Femicide (Lesley McMillan; Glasgow Caledonian University) – This was initially a study of 10 Scottish cases of femicide however Academic Research is looking to secure funding to allow for an extended analysis.• Gender Based Violence & Learning Disabilities – Academic Research have been developing a partnership with Public Protection colleagues and Scottish Commission for people with Learning Disabilities to enhance cooperation and learning in this space.• Extremist-led Violence – Academic Research have agreed to co-host a session in December which will discuss the extremist-led violence in summer 2024.• Youth Violence – SVRU, in conjunction with PT and APU and in partnership with other organisations (e.g. Public Health Scotland, Youthlink, Young Scot and various academic institutions) are

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					<p>aiming to complete a deep dive into the issue of youth violence in Scotland in particular the report aims to produce insight-driven action (prevention activity) locally to help enable collaboration, partnership working and innovation. The SVRU plans to complete this profile by March 2025.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prevention; Personal Safety; and Analytics – SIPR are in the process of bidding for NPCC funding to develop an Academic Centre of Excellence (CoE). The aim would be to establish 3 networks in relation to Prevention, Personal Safety and Analytics. The specific focus of the Prevention strand has not yet been defined but Police Scotland has identified the benefits of including violence in particular violence relevant to children and young people. <p>Propose to Close</p>
